PRESENTATIONS

1. Karen Leif, Clinton County Housing and Homeless Coalition

Karen Leif was present. She introduced John Thelen, Cindy Thelen, and Kaiysha Johnson. She discussed: handouts that were passed out; highlights of the 2025 annual report quick facts; handout on affordable housing; November 6th viewing of "Americans With No Address"; and Hope Works Mid-Michigan is expanding to Clinton County and interested in helping us get a shelter in Clinton County.

Mayor Dzurka thanked them for their work. He said there are much needed services out there. He asked her to talk about what is envisioned with a shelter and how long do you see people staying in a shelter.

Ms. Leif said Hope House has intensive case management: job, training, and education and is 30-90 days maximum.

Commissioner DeLiso asked if homeless shelters in Lansing are overburdened.

Ms. Leif said in the winter it gets harder and folks in Clinton County don't want to go to Lansing. She discussed the support they do have is here and transportation can be an issue.

Commissioner Hufnagel said shelters are overburdened. They had an expansion and are still unable to keep up. He asked about the perception of availability of affordable housing in this area.

Ms. Leif said rents are going up and a lot of landlords are no longer accept housing choice vouchers. A lot of the homeless folks are working.

Ms. Johnson said we have 30% of Clinton County in ALICE.

Commissioner Hufnagel said he has attended some of the homeless awareness events you have sponsored and appreciates the work you are doing to educate the public. He encouraged everyone to attend the event.

Mayor Dzurka gave kudos to the group. He discussed a recent poverty simulation and said he has done a lot of work with ALICE over the years. Thank you to all the groups for their joint collaboration.

Ms. Leif recognized John Thelen for putting together a good group of churches.

OLD BUSINESS

1. Resolution #35-2025 – Resolution to Adopt Fire Code Ordinance Amendment

City Manager Gamble said Chief Douglas has done a tremendous job of summarizing this. He discussed a memo with the city attorney's opinion regarding liability and said there are lots of nuances regarding the code.

Fire Chief Douglas discussed his memo; Michigan Building Code vs. fire code; reasons to adopt the 2021 fire code from memo; MI Building Code deals solely with the construction; fire code and enforcement of life-safety issues; CO (Carbon Monoxide) monitoring; high occupancy; sprinklers are already at Hazel Findlay and Grace Haven and already mandated by MI Building Code; gaps between the fire code and building code; inspections of fire suppression systems; hydrants; fire lanes; jurisdictions throughout the state that have adopted the 2021 code; St. Johns is the county seat; and our ISO rating could go up with adopting a newer code.

There was a discussion of:

- Page 4 of the proposed ordinance.
 - o Is there a trigger if a certain amount of modification is done to the buildings?
 - Chief Douglas discussed Autumn Ridge Apartments as an example and said up to a certain amount of addition before they would have to add a sprinkler system.
 - o There was an example of a house and if it was separated into 2 apartments and the change in overall use. Is that going to trigger fire suppression?
 - Chief Douglas said no since it is residential. The MI Building Code has townhome standards.
- The Michigan Building Code.
- Potential savings for insurance due to ISO rating.
 - o Chief Douglas said our ISO audit and renewal is in 2028 and this would allow us to gain more points.

Motion by Commissioner Hufnagel that the city commission adopt Resolution #35-2025.

The motion died due to lack of support.

Mayor Dzurka asked if the commissioners had any further guidance on the issue.

There was a discussion of:

- Understanding the code and changes people would need to make to become compliant.
- Possibly there are sections in the code we don't want to adopt.
- Having discussions with chief or Chad about concerns.
- Commissioners to bring forward specific guidance and concerns: either have a meeting or send feedback to the chief.
- The commission was appreciative of the Chief's work on this.
- Struggle with the reach and extent of some policies.
- Appreciate it if we can show this reduces overall insurance to everyone.
- Concerns about high cost of rent and housing in the community with more pressures for landlords and business owners.

City Manager Gamble discussed challenges with the code depending on what perspective you are looking at: landlord's or renter's perspective. He discussed receiving comments from the commission and meeting with a couple of representatives.

Commissioner Hufnagel asked that staff look into the issue with tabling an item.

NEW BUSINESS

2. Master Plan/Parks Plan Open House and Community Engagement Update

Chris Khorey, McKenna, was present. He discussed: great event earlier this afternoon; thanked everyone for their participation and thanked Russ for getting materials/outreach ready; the survey is out right now; the general positivity around future land use, sidewalks and bike paths; when it came to the trail and Federal Mogul areas the big advocacy we heard is quality green space; we talked in depth about old 27, specifically south of Sturgis Street where it is chaotic (landscape and street trees, bike path, or 3 lanes, but a mixed opinion on Michigan lefts); working with City Manager Gamble on wordsmithing items; the silo area; the next steps: public hearing at the December 3rd planning commission meeting, wrap up of the survey; city commission meeting on December 8th, adopt parks element of plan on December 8th, and the January meeting it will come back for a final adoption vote on the entire master plan document.

There was a discussion of:

- Map 3 & Map 4, it shows the same map.
- Positive direction on some of the re-writes.
- Scrubbing of the document.

3. Resolution #43-2025 – to Introduce an Ordinance to Amend Section 33.20 and Section 33.22 of Title III: Administration, Chapter 33: City Elections

City Clerk Seavey said PA 227 of 2023 increased the precinct size limit from 2,999 active voters to 4,999 active voters, allowing jurisdictions to condense their precincts. This is due to 9 days of early voting and more people voting by absentee ballot. She recommended the city reduce the number of precincts from 3 to 2. The suggested new dividing line would be M-21/State Street: all voters south of M-21 will be in precinct #1 and all voters north of M-21 will be in precinct #2. She said we would use the extra equipment to set up an Absent Voter Counting Board, which will relieve pressure at the precincts.

Motion by Commissioner Gurski seconded by Commissioner DeLiso that the city commission adopt Resolution #43-2025 as written to Introduce an Ordinance to Amend Section 33.20 and Section 33.22 of Title III: Administration, Chapter 33: City Elections.

Police Chief Kirk said this is an additional review of our ordinances and contemporizing them to line up with the law and prosecution. He said reviews will continue and additional language changes will come to the city commission.

There was a discussion of:

- State statute and local jurisdictions.
 - o Chief Kirk said local ordinance can't be more restrictive than state statute.
- Tension between people moving needles.
 - o Possession of needles without a link to controlled substances wouldn't be criminally enforceable.
- If prosecuted at the local level, we receive the fines.
 - o Costs to the city to prosecute at the local level.
 - Look at fines/fees we capture compared to prosecution costs.
 - The contract we have with the law firm is a set rate irrespective of the prosecution level; flat rate.

• There is not an estimate right now of the number of charges this will cover in a year.

Motion by Commissioner Hyzer seconded by Commissioner Gurski that the city commission adopt Resolution #44-2025.

YEA: Hufnagel, Gurski, Dzurka, DeLiso

NAY: Hyzer Motion carried.

5. Clinton Area Ambulance Service – Amended Articles of Incorporation

City Manager Gamble discussed: the great value of CAASA and their service to the region; changes to the document: levy of a millage, changes to unanimous votes, per capita vs. levy, and withdrawal of the city after a millage.

Commissioner Gurski said the authority had an attorney work through this; addressing issues that were occurring or occurred in the past; St. Johns usually had two members on the board, and this takes us down to one; and 7 municipalities have already signed this.

Ed Thelen, city representative on the authority board, discussed: the old articles; the bylaws; having a final draft of the by-laws at the November meeting; and the millage language in the articles says it would need to be a unanimous vote.

Attorney Seurynck discussed: Article 8 - 2/3's of the municipalities to approve the budget; if there is a district wide millage and we leave the authority, we are still on the hook as long as the millage is in effect; and her concern that it doesn't say the per capita will go away if a millage goes into effect.

Ed Thelen said there was a discussion about it, and they said they would do A or B, but not both (a millage and per capita).

Commissioner Hufnagel asked for details on the financial contribution from each municipality.

Motion by Commissioner Hyzer seconded by Commissioner DeLiso that the city commission approve the 5th Amendment of the Articles of Incorporation of CAASA.

YEA: Hufnagel, Gurski, Dzurka, Hyzer, DeLiso

NAY: None Motion carried.

6. <u>Bingham Water/Sewer Discussions Update</u>

Mayor Dzurka recognized Bingham Township Supervisor John Weber's attendance at the meeting. He said the township worked with Attorney Mike Homier on a draft. This new version is for your consideration, but not for a vote at this meeting. He said we are pretty close here. This is not an authority, just a simple water/sewer agreement to get something in place for potential development as we continue to work towards a larger agreement.

City Manager Gamble said there was some cleaning up, but this is a simple and straight forward bulk water/sewer agreement. He said he worked with Director Smith and staff to scrub this. He discussed: implementation of the fees, capacity surcharge; and that all of the other tenets of this are pretty straight forward.

There was a discussion of:

- Sewer capacity: existing 200,000 gallons/day constraint referenced; debate on whether to mirror that for water. Concern about "super users" exhausting capacity without a clear limit.
- Possibly removing sewer references since sewer framework exists; or one consolidated, simple agreement covering both systems.
- Clarifications: permitting would depend on source system (city vs. township); coexistence of systems anticipated; agreement intended to cue reopening if high-capacity user emerges.
- Capacity Surcharge and Fee Structure Options
 - O City considering taking a percentage of township's existing capital/tap fees for new connections in the township as a buy-in to city infrastructure.
 - O Township already has a sewer-side capital fee schedule based on meter size; proposal to mirror for water.
 - O Suggested benchmarks discussed included a nominal 10% concept tied to 200,000 gallons/day context, but no fixed number agreed.
 - Staff to draft mirrored language using township's fee model for water; commission to decide between upfront fee vs. ongoing surcharge (or both).

There was a discussion that a revised agreement would come back to the commission at the next meeting or soon after.

7. Requested Permanent Electric Transmission Line Easement in Industrial Park

City Manager Gamble said Rick Hammer is here. He said the easement was presented as an opportunity for ITC and their upgrades.

Rick Hammer, realtor, was present. He said they are doing a full rebuild from the Marquette Station to the Bingham Station. He discussed the page that outlines the proposed \$24,217.84 offer. He said the easement is 59' by 349'. He said they are putting in some new poles. He said they are proposing a one-time payment.

Director Smith discussed the land and the easement.

City Manager Gamble discussed the Property Subcommittee and there could be a meeting and bring a recommendation back to the full commission for their consideration.

There was a discussion of the easement.

Mr. Hammer said the easement is a working draft.

8. City Manager Comments

City Manager Gamble discussed:

- Met with developer interested in re-imagining Federal Mogul and adjacent parcels. He will provide a detailed update and present plans at November meeting.
- Townsend property sign is up, and we are getting inquiries. Need to discuss process of receiving proposals and/or sale price of the land. Property Subcommittee meeting on establishing value and receiving proposals.
- Depot project is complete. Flooring looks fantastic and placed the perfect finishing touch on this treasure of a building. Will send some photos in the next update.
- Labrinth installation update 85%-90% complete with anticipated completion by end of the week. Great job to Director Schafer and coordination with the school group.
- Recreation programming update.
- Wilson Center Updates:
 - Roof project is starting tomorrow with the first delivery of material.
 Project duration is 3-4 weeks weather dependent.
 - Awaiting final approval from NPS, federal shutdown is impacting this approval and final comments. New estimated construction date is start of 2026.
 - o Holding a Wilson Center Core Team Kick-off meeting tomorrow at noon.

- Bill Tennant Band Shell Improvements bid tabulation amount. CIP was estimated at \$80,000, bid tabulation review low bid was just shy of \$150,000. Looking at grants to leverage the funding.
- DDA Incubator was approved for a 6-month lease at the former Rise Up Retail Space. Director Hanover, with assistance from LEAP, will be working to stand this up and see how successful this will be.
- Met with Supt. Berthiaume to begin to formulate the agenda for the January 12th special meeting.
- Frontier Cable Project Challenges and October 31st shut down.
- New vehicle just in time for winter!

9. Commissioner Comments

Commissioner Gurski thanked the commission for passage of the articles tonight.

Commissioner DeLiso asked how we stand on a grant application for the Senior Citizen Park.

City Manager Gamble said it is pending, and we should find out in December.

Commissioner Hufnagel said he wanted to make sure we are getting information out on the leaf pick-up and how that is taking place. He said Frontier Fiber Optic are around town a lot. He questioned easements and how far back the easements go.

Director Smith said the city ROW (right-of-way) and utility easements are granted by developers of subdivisions. He said that lies from the sidewalk to the house. With Frontier, it is a replacement of current facilities. He said this is a separate utility easement. We did make them decrease their hours of operation.

Commissioner Hyzer asked when they made application for this.

Director Smith said early this spring.

Mayor Dzurka discussed the challenges of having multiple providers.

Commissioner Hufnagel recognized the work being done on the by-laws of the authority (ambulance). He said it is really necessary.

Commissioner DeLiso asked if there is some leeway in where they work. He asked if they trashed anybody's landscaping.

Director Smith said there were no major complaints there.

Commissioner Hyzer thanked Brad and Ed for their work on the by-laws. He expressed his concern about the holes we have produced ourselves in city streets that have not been fixed yet.

City Manager Gamble said they are scheduled for Wednesday or Thursday for paving. This is done multiple times per year.

Mayor Dzurka said thanks on the fiber piece. For the trail authority, he wanted to recognize volunteers that are out there cleaning the trails. They put in hundreds of hours per month. He said there have been concerns over e-bikes on the trail. There are rules and regulations in place on types of e-bikes you can use.

SUMMARY/HIGHLIGHT: PA 227 of 2023 increased the precinct size limit from 2,999 active voters to 4,999 active voters, allowing jurisdictions to condense their precincts. This is due to the 9 days of early voting as well as more voters voting absentee ballots. Per MCL 168.661(1), reducing the number of precincts must occur 210 days prior to the August primary (August 4, 2026), which means that the ordinance would need to be adopted this year.

At the October 27, 2025 City Commission meeting, the commission adopted Resolution #43-2025 to Introduce the ordinance.

BACKGROUND/DISCUSSION: With fewer precincts, it would result in a more efficient allocation of election administration resources. Making this change would permit the transition of the equipment from the former 3rd precinct to be used as an Absent Voter Counting Board (AVCB). An AVCB would make processing absentee ballots much more efficient than processing them in the precincts. When we process absentee ballots in the precinct, the election inspectors must wait for less busy times to feed the absentee ballots into the tabulator. Also, we would have one less precinct to set up as a voting location with voting booths, etc. saving staff time (clerk & public services).

The new dividing line for precincts will be M-21/State Street. Precinct #1 will remain at the First Baptist Church (all voters south of M-21). This precinct will have more registered voters than Precinct #2 (Nazarene Church) due to the First Baptist Church gym being larger and accommodating more voters as well as the parking area being larger. Also, based on the last Presidential Election, precinct #2 has a higher percentage of their voters utilizing election day voting compared to the other precincts. Precinct #2 (all voters north of M-21) will remain at the Nazarene Church on North Lansing Street.

STRATEGIC PLAN OBJECTIVE: Public Facilities – Goal #1: Continue to offer High Quality Services and Facilities for Residents

FISCAL IMPACT: The fiscal impact would initially be the cost of printing and mailing out new voter ID cards for all registered voters currently in precinct #3 (approximately 1,750), and the voters currently in precinct #1 that would transition to precinct #2 (approximately 135). This cost is estimated to be approximately \$3,000. Each election year we could potentially see some cost savings with needing a few less election workers.

RECOMMENDATION:

Staff recommends the City Commission adopt Resolution #45-2025 to Adopt the Ordinance.

The People of the State of Michigan enact:

Sec. 661. (1) Except as provided in subsection (2), city and township election commissions shall divide precincts according to law, not later than 210 days before the primary next preceding the general November election, and shall immediately notify the county clerk of the number of registered electors in each precinct in the city or township. The county clerk shall notify the secretary of state not later than 200 days before the primary of a precinct in the clerk's county that has not been divided according to law, and the secretary of state shall proceed to make divisions as are necessary at the expense of the city or township involved, not later than 180 days before the primary next preceding the general November election. A division of precincts must be made effective not later than 180 days before the primary election next preceding the general November election.

(2) In the second year following each federal decennial census, precincts must be divided under this subsection. City and township election commissions shall divide precincts not later than 120 days before the primary election next preceding the general November election in order that a precinct, as far as is practical, is not split between districts and does not exceed 4,999 registered electors, and shall immediately notify the county clerk of the number of registered electors in each precinct in each city or township. The county clerk shall notify the secretary of state not later than 110 days before the primary of any precincts in the county that have not been divided, and the secretary of state shall proceed to make the divisions as are necessary, at the expense of the city or township involved, not later than 90 days before the primary election next preceding the general November election. The division of precincts must be made effective not later than 90 days before the primary election. The secretary of state may authorize, on written request by a city or township election commission, a later division of a precinct that contains portions of more than 1 elective district. All precinct divisions must be completed not later than 90 days before the primary election next preceding the general November election. In determining the number of registered voters for a precinct under this subsection, a city or township election commission or the secretary of state, as applicable, must use only the active registered electors for that city or township.

This act is ordered to take immediate effect.

The division of precincts must be made effective not later than 90 days before the primary election. The secretary of state may authorize, on written request by a city or township election commission, a later division of a precinct that contains portions of more than 1 elective district. All precinct divisions must be completed not later than 90 days before the primary election next preceding the general November election. In determining the number of registered voters for a precinct under this subsection, a city or township election commission or the secretary of state, as applicable, must use only the active registered electors for that city or township.



THE CITY OF ST. JOHNS ORDAINS:

Section 1. Amendment to Title III: Administration, Chapter 33: City Elections. The City amends Title III: Administration, Chapter 33: City Elections by amending Section 33.20 to read as follows:

"§ 33.20 DESIGNATION OF PRECINCTS.

- (A) Precinct 1. That portion of the city south of State Street from the west city limits to the east city limits. east of Oakland Street from Townsend Road to Sturgis
- (A) Street, south of Sturgis Street from Oakland to Mead Street, east of Mead Street from Sturgis Street to State Street, south of State Street from Mead to Whittemore Street, east of Whittemore Street from State Street to Gibbs Street, south of Gibbs Street from Whittemore Street to the city limits.
- (B) Precinct 2. That portion of the city north of State Street from the west city limits to Whittemore Street, west of Whittemore Street from State Street to Gibbs Street, north of Gibbs Street from Whittemore Street to the east city limits.
- (C) Precinct 3. That portion of the city south of State Street from the west city limits to Mead Street, west of Mead Street from State Street to Sturgis Street, north of Sturgis Street from Mead Street to Oakland Street, west of Oakland Street from Sturgis Street to the city limits."

Section 2. Amendment to Title III: Administration, Chapter 33: City Elections. The City amends Title III: Administration, Chapter 33: City Elections by amending Section 33.22 to read as follows:

"§ 33.22 POLLING PLACES.

The polling places for each of the Precincts set forth above shall be as follows:

- (A) Precinct 1 First Baptist Church;
- (B) Precinct 2 Nazarene Church;
- (C) Precinct 3 The Wilson Center."

Section 3. Validity and Severability

Should any portion of this Ordinance be found invalid for any reason, such holding shall not be construed as affecting the validity of the remaining portions of this Ordinance.

Section 4. Repealer

Any ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed but only to the extent necessary to give this Ordinance full force and effect.

Comments were received and a compilation of comments and editorial changes and re-formatting was forwarded to the Commission for information and to the Township for their review and comment. Bingham has forwarded a document to Foster Swift for their review and revision. Foster Swift has indicated that they hope to have feedback and or a revised agreement sent to both parties by November 21st. The only comment received as of yet from the Township on the document was their statement to remove references to sewer service in this document.

BACKGROUND/DISCUSSION: Representatives of the Township and City met on October 17, 2025, to discuss a proposed Bulk Water and Sewer Service Agreement (Agreement) drafted by the Township and presented to the City. This agreement will permit the extension of City water and sewer service into additional areas of Bingham Township. This agreement attempts to mirror current agreements that provide water and sewer service to the Township.

Since January 2024, the City of St. Johns and Bingham Township have worked together to explore a utility service partnership that serves the best interests of both communities. Through joint meetings, and other discussions both entities were presented and discussed multiple options for agreements to extend services to Bingham Township. These efforts reflect a shared commitment to implementing the most effective and equitable framework for collaboration.

STRATEGIC PLAN OBJECTIVE: The City and Townships collaboration meets the major tenants of the joint planning area discussion within the City's Master Plan.

FISCAL IMPACT: The formation of this agreement will offer additional customers to the Utility System, allow for more development in the Township, and further regional collaboration.

RECOMMENDATION: It is anticipated by the time of the November meeting additional updates can be provided to the Commission as to the status of conversations and efforts towards finalizing this agreement and obtaining approval of both Boards.

CITY OF ST. JOHNS AND BINGHAM TOWNSHIP BULK WATER AND SEWER SERVICE AGREEMENT Version 11-5-25

This Bulk Water and Sewer Service Agreement (the "Agreement") is entered into on 2025, by and between the City of St. Johns, a Michigan municipal corporation (the "City"), and Bingham Township, a Michigan municipal corporation (the "Township") (together referred to as the "Parties").

RECITALS

WHEREAS, the City owns and operates a water and sewer system capable of providing potable water and sanitary sewer services; and

WHEREAS, the Township desires to extend sewer and water mains within its jurisdiction using State grant funds and to obtain bulk water and sewer services from the City to serve Township residents and businesses; and

WHEREAS, the Parties recognize the mutual benefit of regional cooperation and intend to form a joint water and sewer authority at a future date; and

WHEREAS, the Parties wish to enter into this Agreement to govern the interim provision of water and sewer services from the City to the Township; and

NOW, THEREFORE, the parties agree as follows:

A. Purpose

This Agreement sets forth the terms and conditions under which the City will provide bulk water and sewer services to the Township for distribution to end users within the Township.

B. Term and Termination

- Term. This Agreement shall commence on the date stated above and remain in effect until the formation of a joint water and sewer authority between the City and the Township, which is intended to occur within 12 months from the effective date of this Agreement.
- 2) <u>Termination</u>. Either party may terminate this Agreement with 30 days written notice to the other party, but only after 12 months from the effective date of this Agreement and only if the joint water and sewer authority has not been formed. Otherwise, this Agreement shall only terminate upon the mutual written agreement of the Parties.

Commented [CAG1]: This stipulation is keeping with H.6. and is in essence redundant to that statement.

Commented [CAG2]: This statement is contradictory to the initial clause in this paragraph and should be discussed by both boards.

C. Water Supply and Sewer Services

- The City shall supply potable water to the Township at one or more delivery points as mutually agreed upon and the City shall accept sanitary sewage from the Township at mutually agreed to connection points for treatment and disposal.
- 2) The City shall provide water that meets all applicable state and federal drinking water standards. The City shall maintain reasonable pressure at the delivery point but does not guarantee specific pressure levels beyond that point.

D. New Utility Construction

- The Township shall be responsible for the construction, operation, and maintenance of all infrastructure within its jurisdiction. The Township shall also be responsible for the construction, and costs of the installation of any utilities within the City necessary to establish connectivity to existing City water or sewer piping in order to establish service to Township property.
- 2) The Township shall design and construct all water and sewer utilities in the Township using the City of St. Johns' design standards. The City shall review and approve all connection plans to ensure plans meet design standards and technical compatibility with the existing system. No approval will be unreasonably withheld.
- 3) The Township shall present all planned water utility improvement plans to the City for review and approval. The City will be responsible for obtaining all EGLE permits necessary for new water main installation to the City's Source Water System. The Township shall be responsible for obtaining all EGLE permits necessary for new water main installation to the Township's Source Water System. All other permits and easements required for water utility infrastructure installation in the Township and its related connection to existing utilities shall be the responsibility of the Township to acquire.
- 4) The Township shall present all proposed sewer utility plans for review and approval to ensure plans meet design standards and technical compatibility with the existing system. No approval will be unreasonably withheld. The Township shall be responsible to obtain all permits and easements necessary for the installation of sanitary sewers and related appurtenances.
- 5) The City shall have ownership of all surface and subsurface infrastructure and equipment installed or utilized within the City and the Township shall have ownership of all surface and subsurface infrastructure and equipment installed or utilized within the Township.

E. Rates and Charges

 The Township water users of City sourced water will be billed for water rates utilizing the same rate that is charged to City residents. The City will receive water capital charges based on meter sizes for all City sourced water utility connections in

- accordance with the City's Utility Capital Charge Fees. These rates are adjusted annually by the St. Johns City Commission in accordance with their fiscal year budget approval process.
- 2) The Township sewer users will be billed utilizing the same wastewater rates that are currently being billed to City utility customers. The City will receive sewer capital charges based on meter sizes for all sewer utility connections in accordance with the City's Utility Capital Charge Fees. These rates are adjusted annually by the St. Johns City Commission in accordance with their fiscal year budget approval process.

F. Utility Capacity

The Township has an agreed to sewer capacity of 200,000 gallons per day. It is understood between the two parties that this limit approximates the water capacity limits of the Township as well. Any increase to this limit would be via mutual agreement.

G. Indemnification

Each party shall indemnify and hold harmless the other from any claims, damages, or liabilities arising from its own negligence or willful misconduct in connection with this Agreement.

H. Miscellaneous

- 1) Modification. This Agreement may be modified only in a writing signed by both parties.
- 2) Entire Agreement. This Agreement contains the entire agreement between the parties with respect to the Event. No representation or statement not expressly contained in this Agreement will be binding on either party.
- Governing Law and Venue. Michigan law governs this Agreement. Any dispute between the parties arising out of this Agreement or the Event must be filed in a court of competent jurisdiction in Clinton County, Michigan.
- 4) <u>Assignment.</u> This Agreement may not be assigned by either Party without the prior written consent of the other. This Agreement is binding upon the parties and their successors and assigns.
- 5) <u>Severability.</u> The invalidity of any provision of this Agreement will not affect the remainder of the Agreement.
- 6) <u>Joint Water and Sewer Authority.</u> This Agreement may be superseded by a future intergovernmental agreement or articles of incorporation establishing a joint water and sewer authority between the City and the Township.

SUMMARY/HIGHLIGHT: The City discussed a proposal from an agent of ITC to expand an easement that currently exists in the industrial park for the purpose of upgrading the transmission line infrastructure in this area. There was discussion at the October 27th Commission meeting and a follow up discussion at a meeting of the Property Advisory Committee on November 13, 2025. Members of the Committee discussed the valuation and after investigation by the City Assessor, and feedback from the County Equalization Department, it supports the offer from ORC Utility and Infrastructure Services, LLC on behalf of ITS.

The easement agreement is structured to issue ITC an exclusive easement and to limit the City's ability to construct any buildings and or structures in the easement area (see paragraph 1.d.) Commission is asked to provide direction on the desire for an exclusive or non-exclusive easement. This direction will then be used to finalize the easement document.

BACKGROUND/DISCUSSION: N/A

FISCAL IMPACT: This easement if executed would create a one-time revenue of approximately \$25,000.

WHEREAS, Grantor is the owner of certain real property more particularly described on the attached <u>Exhibit "A"</u> as the "Property".

WHEREAS, Grantor desires to convey to Grantee a perpetual easement upon, under, across and through an Easement Area located on the Property as more particularly described and depicted on <u>Exhibit "A"</u> (the "<u>Easement Area</u>"), upon the terms and conditions stated below.

NOW THEREFORE, for good and valuable consideration, the receipt of which is hereby acknowledged, the Grantor and Grantee hereby agree as follows:

- 1. **Grant of the Easement.** Grantor hereby conveys, warrants and grants to Grantee, its successors and assigns, a perpetual easement (the "<u>Easement</u>") over, under, across and through the Easement Area on the Property with the right, privilege and authority for Grantee, its agents, employees, and contractors, to:
- (a) construct, reconstruct, modify, upgrade, improve, maintain, operate, inspect, replace, repair, patrol and remove an electric transmission line or lines and telecommunications line or lines, consisting of poles, towers, crossarms, insulators, wires, guy wires, anchors and other necessary fixtures, structures, cables (including fiber optic cable), and equipment for transmitting electricity and communications ("Grantee's Facilities");
- (b) temporarily improve the surface as reasonably necessary to place and operate Grantee's construction vehicles and equipment;
- (c) prohibit and/or remove, at Grantee's sole discretion, any buildings or other above ground structures (collectively referred to as "Structures"), excluding currently existing buildings ("Permitted Buildings"), currently existing fences ("Permitted Fences"), and currently existing

surface parking or driveways, which exist as of the Effective Date of this Easement (collectively "Permitted Improvements"). In the event Permitted Improvements currently exist within the Easement Area as of the Effective Date, Grantor may retain such Permitted Improvements provided that, with respect to Permitted Fences, Grantee may: (1) install and maintain a gating system in Permitted Fences, of Grantee's choice, in order to obtain access to the Easement Area for the purposes of construction and maintenance of Grantee's Facilities as provided for herein; and (2) cause such Permitted Fences to be removed as Grantee deems necessary provided that Grantee restores such Permitted Fences to substantially the same condition as existed prior to removal;

- (d) prohibit and/or remove, at Grantee's sole discretion, any future construction of above-ground Structures located or proposed to be located within the Easement Area. Grantee may remove such prohibited Structures from the Easement Area without prior notice and without responsibility for any damage that occurs as a result of such removal. If Grantor proposes to construct any Structures within the Easement Area, a proposed construction plan may be submitted to Grantee for its review and a determination as to whether the proposed Structure would interfere with the safe and reliable operation or maintenance of Grantee's Facilities within the Easement Area. Grantee's approval of a proposed Structure under these circumstances will not be unreasonably withheld;
- (e) at any time cut, trim, remove, destroy or otherwise control any or all trees, bushes, or brush now or hereafter standing or growing upon or within the Easement Area, all at Grantee's sole and absolute discretion;
- (f) have ingress to and egress from the Easement Area at all times on, over and across other portions of the Property; and
- (g) enter upon and cross the Easement Area for the above-described purposes on other land(s).


2. Repair and Restoration. Grantee shall:

- (a) re-grade, repair and restore any portions of the Easement Area or Property damaged by Grantee's temporary placement of surface improvements for the Grantee's construction, operation, maintenance, repair, reconstruction and use of Grantee's Facilities;
- (b) repair or replace at Grantee's sole expense any actual damage located within the Easement Area or Property, arising from Grantee's construction, operation, maintenance, repair, reconstruction and use of Grantee's Facilities. Notwithstanding the foregoing, at no time shall Grantee be responsible for any damage to the extent that such damage results from Grantor's negligence. Upon reasonable notice to Grantee that damage has been sustained, the parties shall work cooperatively to identify the damage and to determine the scope of repair or replacement work; and

- (c) reimburse Grantor, or the owner of the crops if different from the Grantor, the value of any growing crops damaged by Grantee's exercise of any of Grantee's rights under this Agreement.
- 3. **Covenants of Grantor.** Grantor hereby covenants, promises, agrees and acknowledges that at the execution and delivery of this instrument it is the lawful owner of the Easement Area and is seized of a good and indefeasible fee simple estate therein, and subject to existing easements of record will warrant and defend Grantee's and Grantee's successors' and assigns' right to the quiet and peaceable possession of the same for the purposes described herein, forever, against all persons lawfully claiming the same.
- 4. **Binding/Run With The Land**. This conveyance shall be permanent, shall run with the land, and shall be binding upon the parties' successors and assigns.
- 5. **Limited Use/Non-Use.** Limited use or non-use of the rights granted herein shall not prevent later use to the full extent herein conveyed.

SUMMARY/HIGHLIGHT: On October 8, the Planning Commission recommended rezoning 823 N. Lansing Street from MC Municipal Center to R-1 Residential. That rezoning has proceeded to the City Commission for consideration of First Reading on November 24. If approved, the rezoning will be advertised and then brought forth for a second reading for final approval.

BACKGROUND/DISCUSSION: There are several houses on the west side of Lansing Street between Gibbs Street and Daisy Drive that are zoned MC despite being ongoing residential uses and being planned for Modern Spacious Residential on the Future Land Use maps of both the existing Master Plan and the draft update. The owner of 823 N. Lansing has applied for a rezoning to R-1 in order to build a home on the property. McKenna and the Planning Commission are also working on a City-initiated rezoning to rezone the existing homes on the same block to R-1, but that is not yet ready for City Commission consideration.

It is not clear why this residential block is zoned MC. It is possible that the adjacent Gateway North Elementary School was interested in expanding onto the properties at some point, but there are no current plans for them to do so.

STRATEGIC PLAN OBJECTIVE: The proposed rezoning advances the following goals of the (current) Master Plan: Land Use Goals 1a, 4a, 4b, 4c, and 5a, and Neighborhoods Goals 1b, 1c, 1e, 2d, 2e, and 2g.

FISCAL IMPACT: The rezoning of the parcel in question would allow the construction of a new home, providing a small positive impact on property tax revenues.

RECOMMENDATION: Staff recommends the City Commission approve Resolution #47–2025 a Resolution to Introduce an Amendment to the City's Zoning Ordinance to Rezone 823 N. Lansing St.

As requested, we have reviewed the above referenced application for the rezoning of 823 N. Lansing St. (Parcel number: 300-021-200-050-11) from MC – Municipal Center to the R-1 – Low-Density Residential District.

The lot is outlined (approximately) on the aerial photo below. This rezoning is requested so that a single-family dwelling may be constructed on the lot, currently in a Zoning District where dwelling units are not permitted.





Below is the current zoning map of the area. The parcel in question is highlighted.

The two districts are somewhat similar in regard to Special Land Uses and minimum dimensional requirements, though differs in many other aspects. The current MC District does not permit any dwelling units, which causes issues in the attempt to rebuild the house that formerly at on the property. The proposed R-1 District would permit the single-family dwelling unit to be completely reconstructed and still be in compliance with the requirements of the Zoning Ordinance.




REVIEW CRITERIA FOR REZONINGS

When reviewing a rezoning request, the Planning Commission should consider the following criteria.

1. Consistency with the Master Plan.

In order to be approved, a rezoning should be consistent with the Future Land Use Map in the Master Plan. The current Future Land Use map designates the lot as "Modern Spacious Residential" as shown on the map below.

On Page 44, the Master Plan states that the appropriate land uses in the "Modern Spacious Residential" category are "detached single family residential dwelling units, two-family attached residential dwelling units, schools, parks, and other compatible municipal and civic uses." The uses permitted in the R-1 District are consistent with that list in that R-1 allows single-family dwellings.



- 2. **The Site's Physical Compatibility with the Uses Permitted in the Zoning District.** The Planning Commission must consider whether the site can reasonably support the uses permitted in the proposed Zoning District, from a physical perspective.
 - Natural Features: The subject site is a vacant, formerly residential lot that appears to contain an
 accessory shed. It is flat and does not contain protected wetlands or other natural features that would
 restrict development.
 - Road Network: The site fronts Lansing Street, which runs North to South from Old US-127 to West Parks Road. It is not a major thoroughfare, but it does provide efficient access to Old US-127, which in turn provides efficient access to most destinations in St. Johns. The site has sufficient width and length for a driveway to be constructed for the parcel, as the remains of the former driveway are still in place.



3. **Compatibility with Surrounding Uses.** The Planning Commission must consider whether <u>all</u> of the permitted uses in the proposed R-1 District would be appropriate adjacent to the existing surroundings. The table below summarizes the land use attributes of the site and the surrounding properties.

The surrounding land uses on all sides are residential uses, with the exception of the Public School to the West of the site. Since all of these residential parcels along Lansing St. are also zoned MC, it is recommended to rezone these parcels to a residential district in order to prevent spot zoning concerns and to restore the right of these property owners to retain their continuing residential uses.

- 4. **Most Appropriate Zoning District**. The parcel's future land use designation as Modern Spacious Residential strongly suggests being zoned as the R-1 Low Density Residential district.
- 5. **Infrastructure Capacity.** We are not aware of any infrastructure capacity issues that would restrict the allowable uses in the R-1 District. The site has access to public water and sewer without needing any extensions of that system.

RECOMMENDATION

We recommend that the Planning Commission recommend the rezoning to the City Commission, in addition to considering rezonings for adjacent MC-zoned parcels to the R-1 District.





SUMMARY/HIGHLIGHT: On October 8, the Planning Commission recommended rezoning three parcels in the City's industrial area that were not previously zoned, as far as Staff and McKenna can tell from existing records. The Planning Commission recommends that the parcels be zoned I-1, consistent with their surroundings.

BACKGROUND/DISCUSSION: The parcels in question are:

Background:

There is a portion of the St. Johns Industrial Park that is not currently identified on the City's Zoning Map. The unidentified area is owned by three (3) property owners (including the City of St. Johns), consists of roughly 11-acres, and the land is currently zoned *I1 Industrial – High Performance*.

- **Property #1** (Parcel Number 300-004-300-093-51): is owned by the **City of St. Johns** and consists of 30.88-acres in total.
- Property #2 (Parcel Number 300-004-300-099-03): is owned by Glanbia Delaware Inc. and consists of 63.25-acres in total.
- Property #3 (Parcel Number 300-004-300-100-01): is owned by Proliant Dairy Michigan LLC and consists of 11.67-acres in total.

Parcel reports from the Clinton County GIS system have been attached to this memo for each of the properties.







Recommended Action:

An amendment should be made to the City's Zoning Map to identify the roughly 11-acres as part of the *I1-Industrial - High Performance* zoning district.

An amended version of the Zoning Map has been attached for your review.

At the September 10, 2025 meeting, the Planning Commission should vote to hold a public hearing for the map amendment during the October 8, 2025 meeting. Upon conclusion of the public hearing, the Planning Commission should recommend action by the City Commission to adopt the amended Zoning Map.

McKenna staff will publish a public hearing notice in accordance with the Michigan Zoning Enabling Act (Public Act 110 of 2006), upon conclusion of the September 10, 2025 Planning Commission meeting.





SUMMARY/HIGHLIGHT: As part of a continuing review of potentially applicable offenses which can be processed at the City Prosecuting Attorney level, two additional subject areas have been identified for consideration for codification into city ordinances. Those include offenses involving alternative nicotine or vapor products and tobacco as they relate to minors.

BACKGROUND/DISCUSSION: When the Harkness Law Firm assumed prosecutorial duties, part of the contractual agreement was to assess current city ordinances for consistency with applicable state law nexus as well as identify any offenses that could be processed at the City Prosecutor level that currently lacked an empowering city ordinance. Both topics fall within that category. The adoption of these recommendations would continue to improve efficiency by streamlining the prosecution process as well as creating a path for proceeds related to fines and costs to remain at the city level.

STRATEGIC PLAN OBJECTIVE: Adoption of these ordinances will continue to align the Police Department with contemporary best practices and accreditation standards related to the enforcement aspects of these offenses. As noted, it will also shift proceeds from fines and costs that previously would include compensation to the County Prosecuting Attorney to be solely dedicated to the city.

FISCAL IMPACT: The adoption of these ordinances and the local prosecution happening by the City Prosecutor will permit the fines and costs to remain at the City instead of flowing up to the County. The impact would be relatively small but would contribute additional funds to the City in the event that a prosecution happens involving these proposed ordinances.

RECOMMENDATION: Staff recommends the City Commission approve the resolutions to introduce the proposed ordinances to adopt offenses related to alternative nicotine or vapor and tobacco products as they relate to minors.

Each resolution will require separate motions for their approval.

AN ORDINANCE TO ADD SECTION 138.03 AND ADOPT THE OFFENSES OF MINOR IN POSSESSION OF ALTERNATIVE NICOTINE OR VAPOR PRODUCTS. FURNISHING ALTERNATIVE NICOTINE OR VAPOR PRODUCTS TO A MINOR, AND **USE OF FRADULENT IDENTIFICATION BY A MINOR**

THE CITY OF ST. JOHNS ORDAINS:

Section 1. Amendment to Title XIII: General Offenses, Chapter 138: Minors. The City amends Title XIII: General Offenses, Chapter 138: Minors by adding Section 138.03 to read as follows:

"138.03 Use, purchase, or possession of alternative nicotine products or vapor products; selling, giving, or furnishing alternative nicotine or vapor products to minors; misrepresentation of age, fraudulent identification prohibited.

- a.(A) It shall be unlawful for any person under twenty-one (21) years of age to: i.(1) Purchase or attempt to purchase alternative nicotine products or vapor products; ii.(2) Possess or attempt to possess alternative nicotine products or vapor products; iii.(3) Use an alternative nicotine product or vapor product in a public place; iv.(4) Present or offer to an individual purported proof of age that is false, fraudulent, or not actually his or her owner proof of age for the purpose of purchasing, attempting to purchase, possessing, or attempting to possess a vapor product or alternative nicotine product.
- It shall be unlawful for any person to sell, give, or furnish an alternative nicotine product or vapor product to any person under twenty-one (21) years of age.
- An individual who violates subsection (a) shall be responsible for a civil infraction or a misdemeanor as follows:
 - i.(1) For the first violation, the individual is responsible for a civil infraction and shall be fined not more than fifty dollars (\$50.00). The court may order the individual to participate in a health promotion and risk reduction assessment program, if available. In

addition, the court may also order the individual to perform not more than sixteen (16) hours of community service.

- ii.(2) For the second violation, the individual is responsible for a civil infraction and shall be fined not more than fifty dollars (\$50.00). The court may order the individual to participate in a health promotion and risk reduction assessment program, if available. In addition, the court may also order the individual to perform not more than thirty-two (32) hours of community service.
- iii.(3) If a violation of subsection (a) occurs after two (2) or more prior judgments, the individual is guilty of a misdemeanor punishable by a fine of not more than fifty dollars (\$50.00) for each violation. Pursuant to a probation order, the court may also require the individual to participate in a health promotion and risk reduction assessment program, if available. In addition, the court may also order the individual to perform not more than forty-eight (48) hours of community service.
- d.(D) An individual who violates subsection (Bb) is guilty of a misdemeanor punishable by a fine as follows:
 - i-(1) For a first offense, not more than one hundred dollars (\$100.00);
 - ii.(2) For a second or subsequent offense, not more than five hundred dollars (\$500.00);
- e.(E) As used in this section, <u>"</u>alternative nicotine product<u>"</u> means a noncombustible product containing nicotine that is intended for human consumption, whether chewed, absorbed, dissolved, or ingested by any other means;
- (A) As used in this section, "vapor product" means a noncombustible product containing nicotine that employs a heating element, power source, electronic circuit, or other_electronic, chemical, or mechanical means, that can be used to produce vapor from nicotine in a solution or other form. Vapor product includes, but is not limited to: an electronic cigarette, electronic cigarillo, electronic pipe, or similar product or device and a vapor cartridge or other container of nicotine in a solution or other form that is intended to be used with or in an electronic cigarette, electronic cigarillo, electronic pipe, or similar product or device."

Section 1. <u>Amendment to Title XIII: General Offenses, Chapter 138: Minors.</u> The City amends Title XIII: General Offenses, Chapter 138: Minors by adding Section 138.02 to read as follows:

<u>"138.02 Use, purchase, or possession of tobacco products; selling, giving, or furnishing tobacco product by minors; misrepresentation of age, —fraudulent identification prohibited.</u>

- (A) It shall be unlawful for any person under twenty-one (21) years of age to:
 - 4)(1) Purchase or attempt to purchase tobacco products;
 - 2)(2) Possess or attempt to possess tobacco products; or
 - 3)(3) Use a tobacco product in a public place;
- B.(B) It shall be unlawful for any person to sell, give, or furnish a tobacco product to any person under twenty-one (21) years of age.
- (B)(C) It shall be unlawful for any person to misrepresent his or her age for the purpose of <u>purchasing</u>, <u>possessing</u>, <u>or attempting to possessprocuring</u> tobacco products;
- (C)(D) It shall be unlawful for any person under twenty-one (21) years of age to use fraudulent identification for the purpose of <u>purchasing</u>, <u>possessing</u>, <u>or attempting to possessprocuring</u> tobacco products;
- (D)(E) It shall be unlawful for any person to furnish false or fraudulent identification to any person under twenty-one (21) years of age for the purpose of procuring purchasing, possessing, or attempting to possess tobacco products;
- $\frac{(E)(F)}{(E)(E)}$ An individual who violates subsection (Aa) shall be responsible for a civil infraction, punishable by a fine of fifty dollars (\$50.00);
- C.(G) An individual who violates subsections (\underline{B} +), (\underline{C} e), (\underline{D} e), or (\underline{E} e) is guilty of a misdemeanor punishable by a fine of fifty dollars (\$50.00) for each violation.

- (H) As used in this section, <u>"tobacco products"</u> shall mean a product that contains tobacco and is intended for human consumption, including, but not limited to <u>total</u> cigarettes, non-cigarette smoking tobacco, cigars, or smokeless tobacco.
- D-(I) As used in this section, 'smokeless tobacco' shall mean snuff, snus, chewing tobacco, moist snuff, and any other tobacco that is intended to be used or consumed, whether chewed, absorbed, dissolved, inhaled, snorted, sniffed, or ingested, by any means other than smoking or combustion."
